Summary

Coed-y-Felin is an attractive area of ancient semi-natural woodland. It is 5 hectares in size and owned by Cardiff Council. The woodlands are located in Lisvane between Heol Cefn Onn and Millrace Close.

Coed-y-Felin is a Site of Interest for Nature Conservation. It also forms an important section of the Nant Fawr Corridor which has strategic importance in terms of recreation, amenity and wildlife.

An enthusiastic group of local residents has formed a Friends' Group to assist the Council to further improve the woodlands. The area is a very popular local venue for informal recreation.

Features of Interest

History

Coed-y-Felin was previously part of a private estate managed as an informal woodland garden. The woods were acquired for public use in 1980. The Nant fawr brook used to power the Corn Mill known as Llanishen Mill, and gave rise to the name Coed-y-Felin. The site of the old mill pond can still be seen.

Nature

Coed Y Felin is a rich habitat for approximately 100 species of plant including Wood Anemones, Enchanters Nightshade, Herb Bennet and Herb Paris. There are some excellent mature beech and yew trees and a good range of woodland birds like nuthatch, woodpeckers and tree creepers.

Countryside on your doorstep

Nant Fawr Brook

The Nant Fawr Brook runs through the woods and eventually feeds into Roath Park Lake. There is a good sized pond and has a platform used for pond dipping by children from the local school.

Access Within

There is a comprehensive network of paths in Coed-y-Felin. This includes four main paths meeting at a cross roads and a number of more informal paths providing access to the Nant Fawr Brook, the Pond and other features in the woods. Not all paths are surfaced and there are some slopes.

Getting There

By foot – There are entrances to Coed-y-Felin from the surrounding streets. The main paths within the site link up well with the surrounding area of Lisvane.

By bus – The nearest bus route passes along Mill Road in Lisvane with a number of bus stops only a short walk away from Coed-y-Felin. Details of bus routes and services can be found at www.cardiffbus.co.uk

By Train – The nearest train station is Lisvane and Thornhill which is approximately 500 metres north of the woodlands. Details of train services can be found at www.nationalrail.co.uk

By Car – On street parking is available on roads surrounding the woodlands.

Nearby

Coed-y-Felin is located in the Lisvane area of Cardiff. Access is also good to other open spaces:

Cefn Onn Country Park

A popular park in the north of Cardiff with a magnificent collection of native and exotic trees.

Nant Fawr Corridor

A wildlife corridor between Roath Park and the open countryside beyond Lisvane Reservoir.

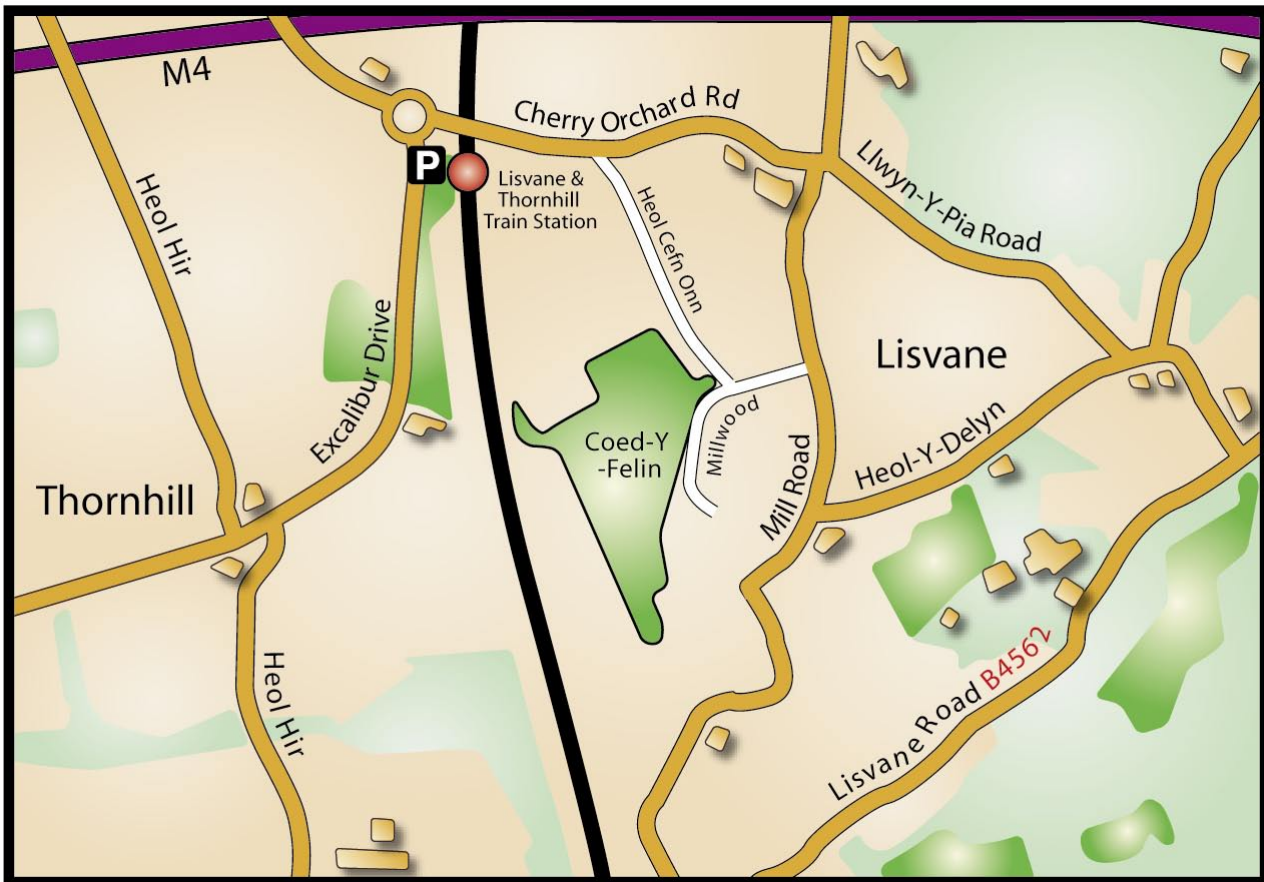
